REBUILDING NYC, EXTENDING OPPORTUNITY

RECOMMENDATION:

Invest in human capital through public-private partnerships to provide access to economic opportunity, improve public safety, and address quality-of-life issues in NYC neighborhoods.



The CCC gave The Doe Fund the chance to engage a new demographic — including female participants like Devin. "This work has been a saving grace. Not only has The Doe Fund been a support system, it's given me the opportunity to be one for my family."

The Men in Blue spent 2021 on the frontlines, cleaning seven days a week, 365 days a year. Their trusted presence in neighborhoods across the city improves quality of life and enhances public safety.

The Doe Fund became an even greater resource to NYC as the chief workforce development conduit for the **City Cleanup Corps** (CCC), a pandemic recovery initiative that provides paid work to New Yorkers in sanitation, graffiti removal, and horticultural services throughout the five boroughs.

The impact of the CCC was seen in 18 neighborhoods that benefited from enhanced sanitation services, counted in \$3M of contract revenue paid to The Doe Fund, and felt by over 360 recruits given paid work and access to Ready, Willing & Able support services.





In 2021, Ready, Willing & Able supervisor Johnny Brito was featured across the country in a Uniqlo campaign honoring essential workers. The Japanese clothing giant has also offered to organize retail training sessions for program participants.

LAYING THE GROUNDWORK FOR CAREERS

RECOMMENDATION:

Reach marginalized populations through workforce development efforts that address labor shortages and lead to careers that pay family-sustaining wages.

America's economy has changed since *Ready, Willing & Able* began. The distance between a minimum wage job and what is needed to rent an apartment and sustain a family has grown — nowhere more so than in New York City.

To address this, The Doe Fund enhanced its workforce development program to **include advanced training that leads to higher-paying careers**. With generous support and participation from corporate partners like SONY, we can now train program participants for **skilled trades** facing hiring shortages like **welding**, as well as for employment in **emerging industries** such as **green jobs**. Both sectors are in high demand as federal spending increases on infrastructure and pandemic recovery.

A FOUNDATION FOR SUCCESS

When **William Hinson** left incarceration, he had a choice. "I knew that I was broken, and I knew it would take hard work to make myself whole again," he said.



So when his son recommended The Doe Fund, he took a leap of faith.

"The Doe Fund gave me the **foundation to make myself whole again**," said William. *Ready, Willing & Able* provided everything William needed to get his life back together—all in one place.

William took advantage of everything the program had to offer. One year later, he graduated with a job, a degree, and an apartment for himself and his girlfriend.

Now, he works as a concierge in Manhattan. Since the pandemic began, he has served as a frontline hero, keeping the building's residents safe from the moment they walk through the lobby.

"I'm proud to be an essential worker," William said. "It reminds me of what *Ready, Willing & Able* taught me every day while I was in the program: that I am an asset, not a liability. That I bring so much to the table — for myself, my family, **and my entire city**."

DEVELOPING A FRAMEWORK FOR HOUSING

RECOMMENDATION:

Innovate to address NYC's housing crisis by repurposing existing properties and converting vacant spaces into permanent housing for our program graduates and other New Yorkers in need.

People experiencing homelessness are not a monolith. The majority are single adults who have the ability and desire to work. This population benefits most from transitional housing combined with paid work and social services.

For the smaller percentage of the homeless population who cannot work — such as the elderly and individuals with medical conditions, mental illnesses, or physical disabilities — permanent affordable and supportive housing is best.

Permanent Housing

The Doe Fund's portfolio of affordable and supportive housing is an essential, **permanent** solution.

In addition, The Doe Fund is pioneering innovative solutions to address New York City's housing crisis. This includes closing a deal to convert a pandemic-shuttered hotel into low-cost SRO (single room occupancy) housing specifically for *Ready, Willing & Able* graduates.







In 2021, we opened three new residences:

- 1325 Jerome Avenue
- 980 Westchester Avenue
- The Muller Residences at 555 Nereid Avenue



Built on the site of a former Army Reserve Center, the Muller Residences has units earmarked for **formerly homeless veterans** like Tony Hinson. After his honorable discharge, Tony was diagnosed with PTSD and bipolar disorder, which led him to addiction and homelessness. Now, he's on the path to recovery. "The unsafe conditions, danger, and assaults just because I was homeless... Now because of this organization, I am finally safe."

Transitional Housing:

In 2021, The Doe Fund secured financing to renovate and expand its original *Ready, Willing & Able* transitional residence. When completed, **510-520 Gates Avenue** will house over 260 individuals.

BUILDING TO SCALE

RECOMMENDATION:

Provide training and support to stakeholders looking to reduce homelessness and recidivism in communities throughout the US.

In 2021, The Doe Fund formalized the Work Works Affiliate Network, a partnership of six programs modeled after Ready, Willing & Able in urban, suburban, and rural communities across the country. This network will lead efforts to scale the Work Works model to new locations by providing resources and training.

The model's focus on paid work in social enterprise — which offsets program and taxpayer costs while putting money into trainees' pockets — means it can be tailored to address the needs of any community. It also makes Work Works equally viable in red, blue, and purple states.

To further establish coalitions that support the Work Works movement, The Doe Fund deepened connections with the International City/County Management Association, the National League of Cities, and the United States Conference of Mayors.

ELEVATING THE PLATFORM

RECOMMENDATION:

Leverage The Doe Fund's expertise as a direct service organization to influence policies that impact people reentering society after homelessness and incarceration.

Shaping Policy

In 2021, The Doe Fund built connections with political leaders as close to home as Mayor Eric Adams and as far as Representative French Hill in Arkansas, joined the New York City Employment and Training Coalition, presented before the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness, participated in the March Against Gun Violence, and testified before the New York City Council on the state of homelessness.

Developing Leaders

In 2021, the organization embarked on an **Equity, Advancement and Belonging initiative** to ensure it continues to **elevate staff members as experts in reentry solutions.**
